Puppies can get worms from their mother in utero or from nursing. Many puppies are born with microscopically tiny roundworms, or ascarid larvae, in their tissues.2

Nursing kittens often contract worms from their mom, which is why the deworming of kittens begins at a young age.3

Contact with infected stool, contaminated soil, or eating infected prey animals also transmits parasites.

And yes, worms can be passed between dogs and cats. In the case of tapeworms, fleas are the transmission culprits.
